Enhancing Clinical Competence through Multisource Feedback

There is more emphasis on assessment for learning than assessment of learning, in recent years. More and more programs are adapting programmatic assessment or at least some elements of this.

We have been using Workplace Based Assessment for assessing overseas trained doctors for over 12 years using mini-CEX, case-based discussions and multisource feedback (MSF). We found MSF to be a reliable tool which helped the learners to improve their performance. We will discuss our experience with MSF in this presentation.
